I have to admit that I love the seasons of the Church year that include Advent through Easter, as they are filled with so many amazing stories in the life of Jesus. The journey of Lent is filled with quiet opportunity for renewal and the Easter Season is filled with new life, joy, and celebration. And we cannot forget the excitement and beauty of the Day of Pentecost with everyone dressed in red and the birth of the Church. I'm not AS fond of Trinity Sunday because it celebrates both doctrine and mystery that simply defies understanding that I find very difficult to preach a meaningful sermon on. But on June 15, we enter the long "Season after Pentecost", which occupies half of the Church Year.

The Roman Catholic Church calls it "Ordinary Time" which, I think describes it well. Because this season is void of the drama of the Christ story and is all about the birth and growth and work of the Church. Not that this is not an important part of the Church Year; it most certainly turns us to the challenge of being the Church. And that's my point: the Season after Pentecost is about the challenge of being the Church, in this time and in this place. As we are well aware, the Church has been in decline for quite some time in our country, and even longer in Europe. The only place that it is quickly growing is in Africa.

This season will challenge us to ask ourselves over and over again, "Who are we as the Christian Church, the Lutheran Church in 21st Century America?" I know that we are a happy little band of disciples at Gloria Dei, with many traditions and patterns fully settled. And trust me, I am not going to challenge any of those traditions. But even as we are a church of mostly elders, we still have to ask ourselves what our role is in our community, our country, our world. How are we sharing the love and grace of God as individuals and as a community of faith. I am constantly delighted that several of the visitors who do come to worship with us since I've been here have decided to stick around. In this Season after Pentecost, I think we need to ask ourselves if there is more we can do to encourage people to walk in our doors, not just to grow our community, but so they can hear and experience the love and grace of God in this wonderful congregation. I apologize when I tell you that this is the challenge that has stumped me for years, no decades, and I don't like this

Thank you to all who attended our Annual Congregational meeting on May 18th. We had a wonderful lunch, thanks to Marilyn Bittle and her Hospitality committee and we took care of important business for our church family.

GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS.



At the January Congregational Meeting, the Congregation asked that I inform them regarding how money sent to Synod is used. This article responds to that request.

Money paid to Synod is identified herein as Mission Support. For Gloria Dei, it is \$4,200 in CY 2025.

The Synod Income Statement for Fiscal Year 2024 identifies Mission Support income from all churches as \$816,884. Fifty percent of Mission Support Income is sent to Churchwide for Mission Support. The remainder is used by Synod to support staff and Synod programs. See Synod Revenue and Expense charts for more detail. A third chart sets out how the money that is sent to Churchwide is employed.


Not directly included in Synod income is revenue and expense pertaining to properties held and sold by the Synod. A portion of the proceeds from sales is transferred annually to Synod income and is identified in the Synod Revenue chart as RE income.





WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE LUTHERAN IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

First and foremost, to be Lutheran means to be Christian. We believe and wish to live out the words of the Apostles creed, believing in God the creator, Jesus the Savior and the Holy Spirit, God's gift to the church to bring us together in love with God, each other and this world. Second, to be Lutheran means to understand that God does everything, we can do nothing without God. Instead of believing somehow we can do enough right things to impress God, we humbly admit God loves us first, reconciles with us first, offers the Holy Spirit to us first, and then, because we are loved, we have the ability to love others.

As Ephesians 2:4-5 says, "God, who is rich in mercy, loved us, even when we were dead to sin and made us alive together with Christ. By grace, you have been saved." Lutherans rely entirely on God's grace, this gift which was given to us to make us whole.


To be a Lutheran in Southern California means to take this love of God, a powerful healing gift, and share it with our diverse neighbors. Southern Californians live with the enormous privilege of good weather and easy transportation. We have a good economy and various ways to earn a living and an education. We have access to health care and services. This does not mean everyone has access to everything. But there are options available, and as Christians answering a call to love our neighbors generously, we work to connect those without services to meet their basic needs. We are connected to the land, the ocean and the mountains in ways many other regions of the country cannot. We have a serious need to love and care for our resources and environment.

We also have a diversity of language and national origin. We hear a variety of languages spoken on our playgrounds, in our grocery stores and at our sporting events. Our congregations need to live among this diversity, bringing love and curiosity to the richness of our environment. It is expensive to live in this part of the country, so we also need to work toward economic equity and reality. Many of our congregations cannot afford full-time pastors, so to be Lutheran in Southern California means lay leaders may need to take significant leadership roles. This provides yet another opportunity for diversity and growth.

Because of these realities, our synod is engaged with immigration issues, educational offerings and LGBTQ support. We lift up lay leaders and invite a wide variety of people to our tables, both the tables of Holy Communion, lunch tables and conference meeting tables. We experience God's abundance in this place, and strive to share it, with God's help, in everything we do.




Newly elected Pope Leo XIV appears at the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica at the Vatican May 8, 2025. (AP/Markus Schreiber)
