### **GOOD STEWARDS OF GRACE**

Quite a few years ago, maybe 20, I got a phone call at 7:00 on Easter morning telling me that one of the matriarchs of the congregation had died in the middle of the night. I instantly knew that I could not preach the sermon I had written for Easter and had only the time it took me to shower, get ready, and drive to Van Nuys (about 45 minutes on a Sunday morning) to "write" a new sermon. I had to preach an impromptu sermon that brought resurrection home to a community who found out when I started the sermon that their beloved friend Louise had died. I did it and it went really well. The congregation responded very positively and some even told me that if they couldn't make it to Louise's funeral, it would be OK with them because of my Easter sermon. With that success, I tried it again and again and got very good results. This became my method of preaching. I did my usual preparation and then preached it on Sunday morning. This worked well for many years. Then, I started to get lazy on the prep when I was serving two interim congregations at the same time, starting in 2018. I wasn't happy in the situation I was in but didn't have other good choices. I wasn't making enough money to live on and consistently had to take money out of my pension funds to survive, always knowing that it was less and less likely that I would ever be able to afford to retire.

I knew when I came to Gloria Dei that I was following an excellent preacher, and I was very nervous. It wasn't long before I finally admitted to myself that my memory wasn't as good as it had been, and this had been going on for a couple of years, causing me to search for words that used to come easily to me. I even got myself evaluated twice for Alzheimer's disease but was told twice that this was simply a function of aging. I began writing out my sermons again. Early this year I realized that I had been out of my preparation practices that I had used for many years, and I was having a hard time getting back to them. I had even started dreading preaching, when it had always been one of my great loves of ministry. While many of you have good things to say about my preaching, it isn't up to MY standards.

In March I subscribed to online program called "Backstory Preaching" a whole process and community of preachers gathered

into one website, with several daily zoom meetings over the week to support the sermon prep process. I have gotten a lot from this wonderful group of Biblical preachers, and then I got invited to join in their Mentorship Program. This continuing education program includes process and preaching, including recording sermons and getting feedback from my small group, one-on-one mentoring from my assigned mentor, reading and discussing books, and large group meetings once a month for ten months. It will also include some people in the congregation giving me feedback with the Mentorship's guidelines. The cost is high at \$4,000, but I decided I had to apply. And I got accepted.

I asked Bishop Bos for a scholarship and she graciously gave me \$1,500.00 With what's left of my continuing education fund for this year and next, I have nearly \$3000 total, and I will be responsible for a little over \$1,000, which might be a bit tricky since I have to move and my rent will be no doubt be going up, but I will find a way to make this work. I am investing in this continuing education for myself at the age of 71 (which seems young to many of you!) because I want to love preaching again (which is getting more joyful for me over the last several months). And I want to preach the best sermons that I can in order to better feed this wonderful community with the Word of God. You are a very Biblically and Theologically astute congregation and I want to live up to that. You will be reading and hearing more about this wonderful program. I have high hopes for it all.

Accompanying Migrants with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO)

The word "amparo" in Spanish means the protection of a living creature from suffering or damage. This ELCA's strategy was envisioned after witnessing the plight of children who are forced to flee

their communities because of complex and interrelated reasons, including chronic violence, poverty, environmental displacement and lack of opportunities in El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala. The ELCA is well-positioned to help ensure that these vulnerable children are protected. In a holistic, whole church response that connects international and US outcomes, the ELCA has developed this strategy based on the following commitments:

- Uphold and guarantee basic human rights & safety of migrant children and their families;
- Address the drivers of migration around the world and the treatment of migrants in transit;
- Work toward just and humane policies affecting migrants in and outside the U.S.;

- Engage as a church body with all of its companions, affiliates and partners to respond to the migration situation and its causes and to advocate for migrant children

### NONPROFIT PAYS REFUGEES TO LEARN TO COOK



Emma Lazarus' poem "The New Colossus" is inscribed on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty as an immortal monument to the freedom and promise of immigrating to the US. Her legacy lives through Emma's Torch, a program where refugees new to New York learn to cook, with the goal of joining the city's vibrant culinary scene and gaining financial independence.


The 500 students at Emma's Torch are paid to receive culinary training through the nonprofit, where they also learn how to read a paycheck, understand their legal protections and navigate the job market. Customers win, too, because students at Emma's Torch get to help build the mouthwatering menu at the program's cafés, where items range from North African shakshuka to black-eyed pea fritter salad. The program also helps provide chefs-in-training with health care, shelter, food and access to immigration lawyers.

The reality of immigration is far less rosy than Lazarus' poem made it sound. But Emma's Torch aims to make refugees' move to the United States as painless — and delicious — as possible.

Reading today's headlines, one might easily sense the gulf between faith and science widening. Polls show that many Americans feel science and religion are in conflict, and culture wars continue to rage around religious convictions and belief in science. But for **Carmelo Santos-Rolón**, it's more important than ever that faith and science are in dialogue.

A scientist turned pastor, Santos-Rolón believes that science and theology can work together to reveal the beauty of God's creation and bring healing to the world. In his new book, A Liberation Theology of the Brain: Neuroscience, Theology, and Decolonizing Emotions (Fortress Press, 2025), he connects the science of the brain, mind and body to the mystery of transcendence—and to liberating ourselves and others.


